We will discuss strategies to teach and evaluate these skills including, the utilization of the SBAR framework for post-conference debriefing, collaborative quizzing, and even updates to the dreaded clinical paperwork.

They need to be able to follow directions, prioritize care, make sound clinical decisions and problem solve appropriately. All these skills are necessary to make sound clinical judgments. After graduation, students need to successfully pass the NCLEX. In 2023, the NCLEX exam was changed to better assess decision making and clinical judgment. To better prepare our students, faculty must incorporate NGN questions in all course exams and use teaching strategies that promote clinical judgment skills. A quasi-experimental pretest posttest study was conducted with senior level students during the Fall 2023 semester. The purposes of this study were to 1) improve students' clinical judgment skills by utilizing a NGN Quizzing tool to improve student's perceptions of their problem-solving abilities 3) improve student's clinical decision-making skills and 4) prepare students for NGN. Improving clinical judgment skills will allow for an easier transition into the graduate nurse role, leading to enhanced patient healthcare quality.

Academic dishonesty and professional misconduct are not new topics to nursing education, but the prevalence seems to be on the increase. Professional behaviors and academic integrity are essential to the nursing profession and the lack of these behaviors can have a detrimental effect on the nursing profession and ultimately the care provided to clients (Amsberry, 2022). While nurse educators know academic dishonesty occurs and have experienced professional misconduct by students, how these topics are prevented and dealt with is not always as clear cut and simple as it may seem.
